



The ACLU of Delaware seeks a Fellow who has a demonstrated commitment to public interest work and/or civil rights and civil liberties and who is in a position to volunteer for six months to a year. The ACLU of Delaware is an affiliate of the American Civil Liberties Union, a national nonprofit organization devoted to the protection of civil liberties and civil rights. The ACLU of Delaware is located in Wilmington, Delaware, a medium-sized city located halfway between Washington, D.C. and New York City. By car, Wilmington is approximately 35 minutes from Philadelphia and an hour from Baltimore. A local commuter train runs regularly between Philadelphia and Wilmington.

The ACLU of Delaware uses a combination of litigation, negotiation, lobbying, public education, and grassroots organizing to achieve its goals. The Fellow will report to the Legal Director, and can anticipate working on a wide range of civil liberties issues, including prisoners' rights, racial justice, LGBT rights, criminal justice, police accountability, privacy, students' rights, religious liberty, and freedom of speech. The position offers an opportunity to become intimately familiar with a wide range of cutting-edge, contentious and significant legal issues, and to be at the center of civil liberties litigation in the State of Delaware.

The ACLU of Delaware cannot provide pay or benefits, but the Fellow will be covered by the ACLU of Delaware's malpractice insurance.
