Subject: Delaware Statewide Issues Survey — Methodology and Toplines

Summary

Survey 160 fielded a statewide dual-mode survey of the Delaware general population, measuring attitudes on fifteen policy statements spanning policing and surveillance, immigration enforcement, voting and elections, and marriage and public education. After processing, the survey yielded 603 completed interviews across two modes — a text-to-web (T2W) arm and an interactive voice response (IVR) phone arm — drawn from the L2 registered-voter file. Responses were combined and weighted to the profile of the Delaware electorate using iterative proportional fitting (raking) on sampling strata, race, education, gender, and party. All percentages in this memo are weighted.

The central pattern is a clear gradient from broad consensus to sharp division. Statements about government transparency and the integrity of the vote achieve widespread consensus: more than eight in ten agree that voting is a right for people and not corporations (84%), that police should be barred from buying private data without a warrant (81%), and that body-camera video should be made public (81%). Support narrows through the marriage, election-administration, and immigration-procedure items, all of which still clear a majority, and turns to majority disagreement on one statement: that Delaware's public schools already have enough funding (29% agree).

Three factors consistently correlate with opinion. Party is the dominant cleavage on every contested item and is widest across the immigration-enforcement statements, where Democrat–Republican gaps exceed sixty points. Gender is the second divider: women register higher agreement than men on nearly every contested statement outside school funding, often by ten to twenty-two points. Age is the third: agreement with the survey's best-supported statements — those concerning transparency and privacy — declines steadily with age, so the widest majorities rest disproportionately on the youngest respondents, while on immigration procedure the 45–64 band, not the oldest, is the most resistant. Geography matters at the margin — New Castle County is with few exceptions the most agreeable, with Kent and Sussex lower, especially on immigration. The remainder of this memo presents findings by topic and then describes the methodology.

Findings

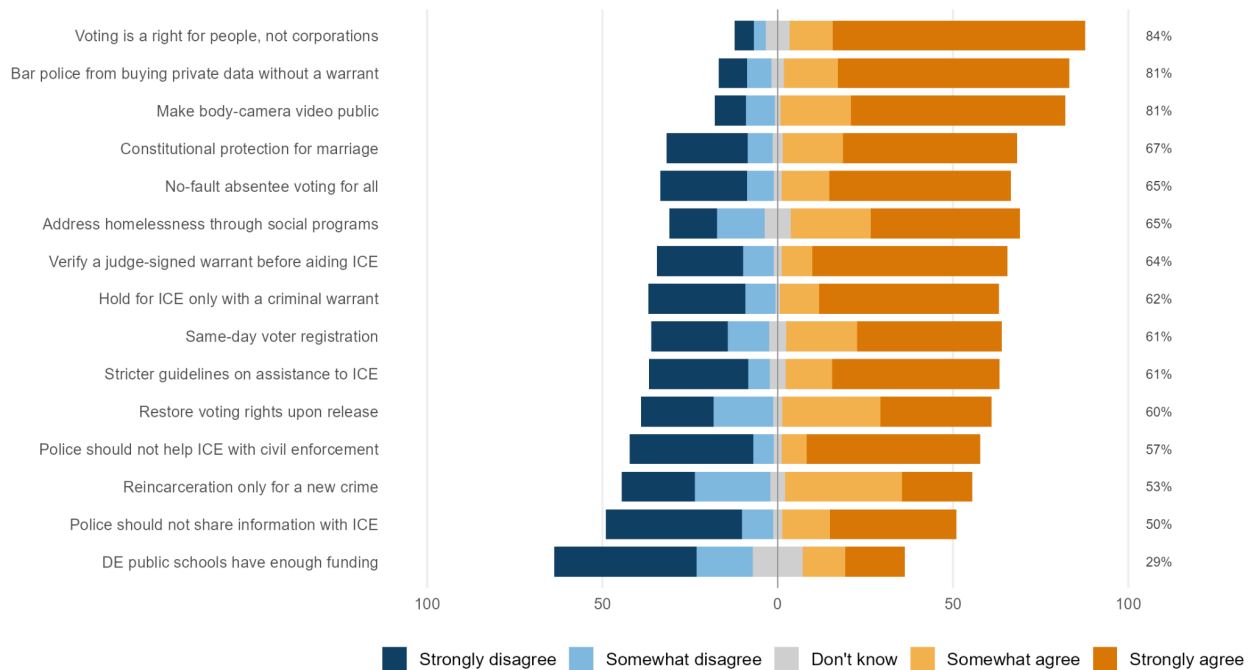


Figure 1: Net agreement with each statement as worded, ordered high to low (weighted; Don't know centered).

Figure 1 arrays all fifteen statements from broadest to narrowest agreement, with each bar split into its five response categories and "Don't know" centered. It is the clearest single view of where Delaware lands: a cluster of near-consensus items at the top, a broad band of majority-agree statements through the middle, and a single statement at the bottom where the state leans toward disagreement.

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Figure 1. Where Delaware stands, statement by statement

Policing, Criminal Justice, and Surveillance

Transparency and privacy statements are the ones that generate the most consensus: 81% agree police should be barred from purchasing private data without a warrant and 81% that body-camera footage should be made public, both with strong-agree majorities. Addressing homelessness through social programs draws 65% agreement, and limiting reincarceration to cases involving a new crime 53% — though the composition of that last majority differs sharply from the items above it, with only 20% strongly agreeing and 33% agreeing somewhat, making it the softest majority in the survey.

Immigration and ICE

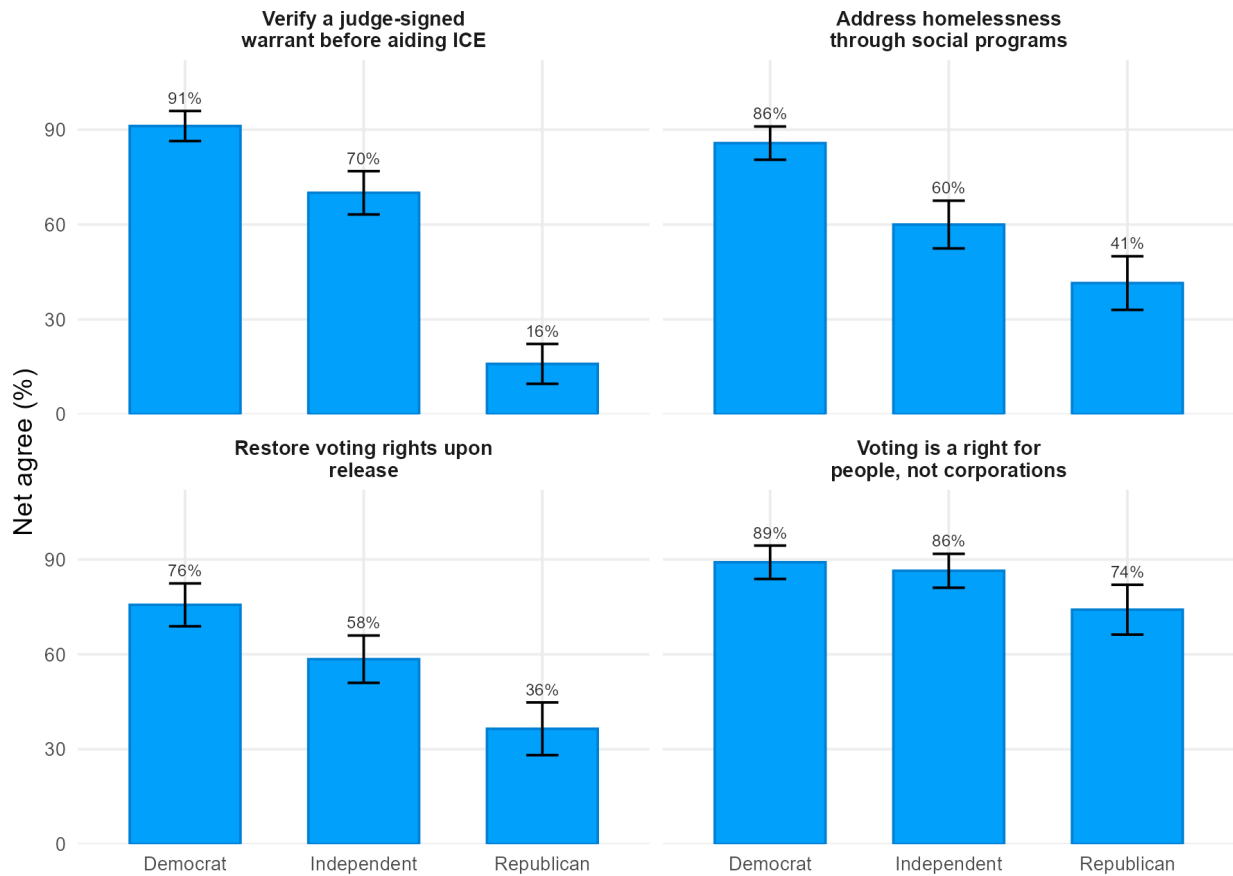


Figure 2. Net agreement by self-reported party. Error bars are 95% confidence intervals.

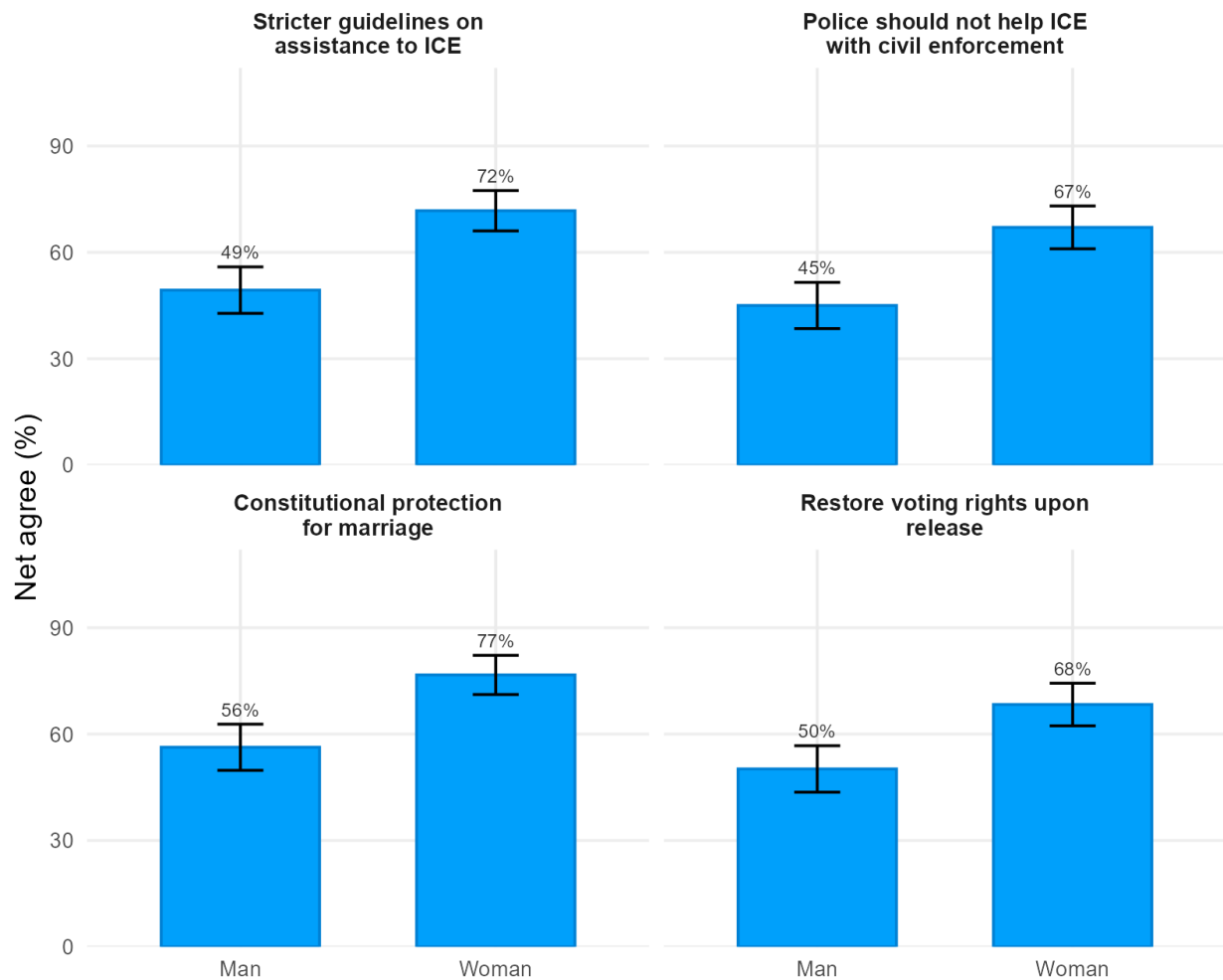


Figure 3. Net agreement by gender (“some other way” excluded, n too small). Error bars are 95% confidence intervals.

Majorities endorse each of the procedural limits on local cooperation with ICE: verifying a judge-signed warrant before assisting (64%), holding for ICE only on a criminal warrant (62%), stricter guidelines on assistance to ICE (61%), and declining to help ICE with civil enforcement (57%). Support is thinnest on the broadest statement in the group — that police should not share information with ICE — which splits almost evenly at 50% agreeing and 48% disagreeing. This cluster is where partisanship is most extreme: agreement that police should not share information with ICE runs 82% among Democrats versus 4% among Republicans, and warrant verification 91% versus 16% (Figure 2). It is also where gender and geography move most — women are markedly more agreeable than men (see Figure 3), and New Castle County runs well above Kent and Sussex (for example, 63% agree police should not assist civil enforcement in New Castle versus 49% in each of the other two counties).

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Voting and Democracy

The election-and-democracy statements are broadly popular. Agreement that voting is a right for people and not corporations tops the entire survey at 84%, and is the rare item that holds a majority even among Republicans (74%). No-fault absentee voting for all (66%), same-day registration (61%), and restoring voting rights upon release (60%) all clear a majority, though each carries a substantial partisan gap — restoration of voting rights, for instance, runs 76% among Democrats and 36% among Republicans.

Marriage and Public Education

Constitutional protection for marriage draws 67% agreement, with half the sample (50%) strongly agreeing and 30% disagreeing; gender is a strong divider here, with women at 77% and men at 56%. The statement that Delaware's public schools already have enough funding is the only one in the survey to draw majority disagreement: 29% agree while 57% disagree. It carries the survey's highest "Don't know" share (14%), indicating lower salience or less settled opinion, and — unusually — higher agreement among Republicans (47%) than Democrats (17%), the only statement on which that ordering holds.

Correlates of Opinion

Party

Self-reported party is the single strongest divider on contested items. As Figure 2 shows, the gap is widest on immigration procedure — agreement that a judge-signed warrant should be verified before aiding ICE runs from 91% of Democrats to 16% of Republicans — and remains large on social-program and voting-rights items, at 86% versus 41% on addressing homelessness through social programs and 76% versus 36% on restoring voting rights upon release. It narrows to near-consensus only on the broadest democratic-values statement, where even Republicans agree at 74% that voting is a right for people rather than corporations.

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Figure 2. Correlates of opinion: Party

Gender

Gender is the second consistent driver, and its effect is unusually uniform: women register higher agreement than men on nearly every contested statement. As Figure 3 illustrates, the gap is on the order of twenty points on stricter ICE guidelines (72% vs. 49%), declining to help ICE with civil enforcement (67% vs. 45%), constitutional marriage protection (77% vs. 56%), and restoring voting rights upon release (68% vs. 50%). The pattern persists across topic areas, making gender a structural feature of Delaware opinion on these issues rather than an artifact of any single item.

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Figure 3. Correlates of opinion: Gender

Age

Age is the third consistent correlate, and its effect is concentrated on precisely the statements that draw the widest overall support. As Figure 4 illustrates, agreement that body-camera video should be made public falls from 95% among respondents 18–29 to 77% among those 65 and older; that police should be barred from buying private data without a warrant, from 91% to 76%; and that voting is a right for people rather than corporations, from 91% to 82%. These are the only three statements on which agreement declines steadily across all four age bands — and they are also the three most popular items in the survey. The near-consensus at the top of Figure 1 therefore rests disproportionately on younger respondents.

Elsewhere the age pattern is not a simple gradient. On the immigration-procedure and election-administration statements, the 45–64 band is consistently the least agreeable, often falling below respondents 65 and older. Agreement that police should not share information with

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ICE runs 38% among those 45–64 versus 52% among those 65 and older, and the same trough appears on holding for ICE only with a criminal warrant (54% vs. 64%), same-day registration (55% vs. 60%), no-fault absentee voting (58% vs. 66%), and constitutional protection for marriage (60% vs. 67%). Age on these issues is not a straight generational line; the middle-aged cohort, not the oldest, is the most resistant.

Figure 4. Correlates of opinion: Age

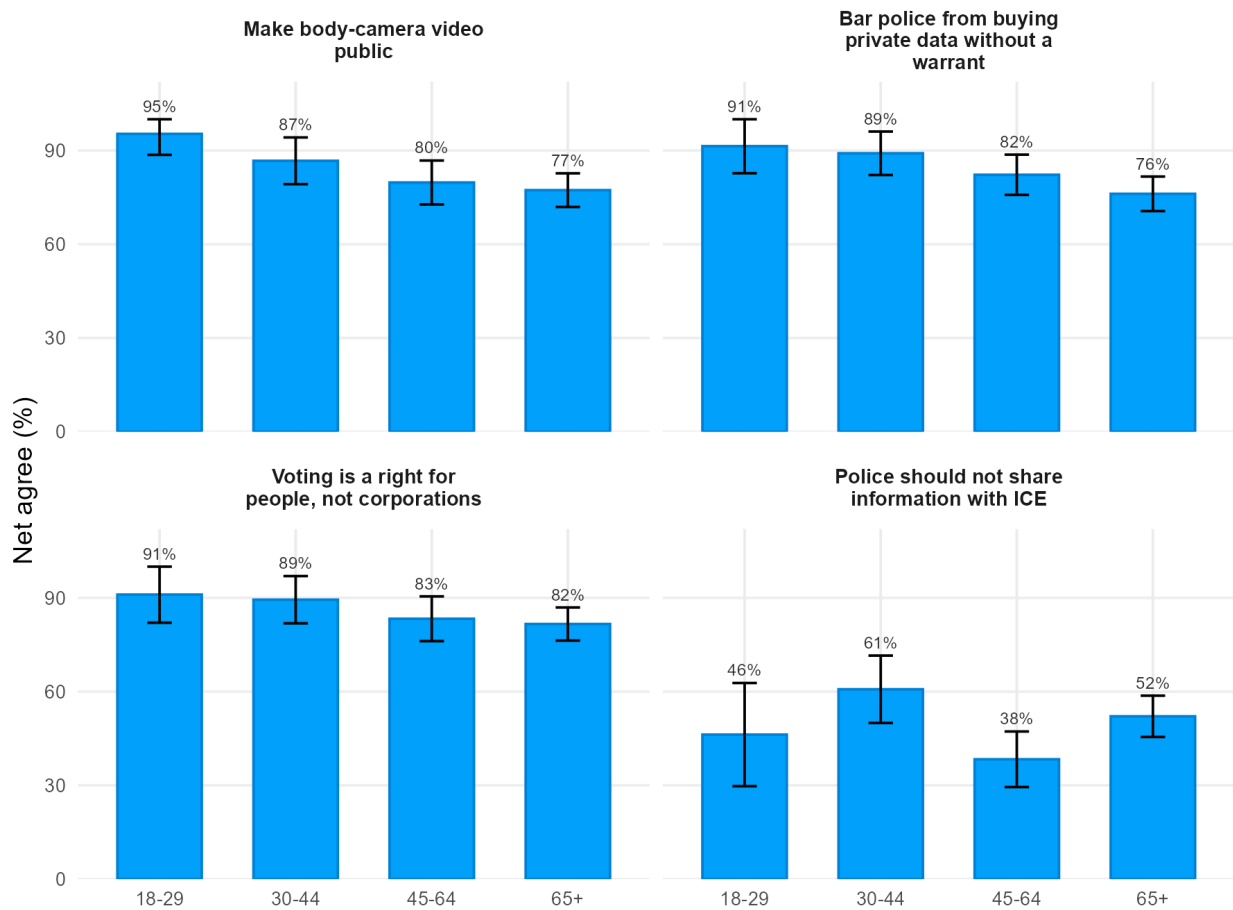


Figure 4. Net agreement by age. Error bars are 95% confidence intervals.

Because the youngest band comprises only 45 unweighted respondents, the 18–29 figures should be read as directional; the 30–44, 45–64, and 65-and-older comparisons rest on 104, 161, and 293 cases respectively and are firmer. Educational attainment, by contrast, differentiates very little across the battery — most items vary by fewer than eight points between college and non-college respondents — though it was retained as a weighting margin.

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Methodology

Overview

The survey was fielded July 13–17, 2026. Interviews were completed in two modes: 481 (80%) by text-to-web (fielded Monday, July 13 through Friday, July 17) and 122 (20%) by interactive voice response (IVR) phone (fielded Monday, July 13 through Wednesday, July 15), for a combined 603 completed interviews. After weighting, the sample has a Kish design effect of 1.34 yielding a design-effect-adjusted margin of error of approximately ± 4.6 percentage points at the 95 percent confidence level for full-sample estimates.

Sampling

We sampled potential respondents from the L2 voter file of registered Delaware voters, a universe of 771,261 records. The population was divided into 48 non-overlapping strata defined by race (Non-White; White + Unknown), participation in the 2024 general election, age, county (New Castle, Kent, Sussex), and — for the White + Unknown group — party registration. This stratification defined a target number of completes for each stratum, set proportional to the stratum's share of the Delaware universe and summing to a target of 600 completes; the required sample per stratum was then sized using response-rate assumptions carried over from prior surveys. Sample was restricted to records with a usable phone number and allocated across the two modes according to Delaware phone coverage.

Fielding

The text-to-web survey was fielded from Monday, July 13 through Friday, July 17, 2026. The interactive voice response (IVR) phone survey was fielded from Monday, July 13 through Wednesday, July 15, 2026. Because roughly one in six Delaware records with a usable phone number has a landline only, the IVR arm was sized to reach that landline-reliant segment, with the large majority of completes coming through text-to-web. Before analysis we removed duplicate submissions, discarding 4 duplicate text-to-web completed interviews. After deduplication, the combined mixed-mode sample comprised 603 completed interviews (481 text-to-web, 122 IVR).

Weighting

We pooled the two modes and applied post-stratification weighting by iterative proportional fitting (raking), aligning the sample's marginal distributions to five margins: the sampling strata, race (four categories), educational attainment (college / non-college), gender (three categories), and party. Rather than weight across full demographic intersections — which at this sample size would produce empty cells — raking matches each margin in turn. Benchmark sources are mixed by design: the strata and party targets are derived from the L2 voter file (for party, self-reported identification was raked to registration-based targets, so the weighted party distribution reflects registration shares); race and educational-attainment targets from U.S. Census figures for Delaware (total resident population for race, the population 18 and older for education); and the gender target from the Pew NPORS national distribution, as no Delaware-specific benchmark was available. County is captured within the strata. Three strata — all in the White + Unknown group in Kent County — contained no completes and were collapsed into same-county, same-party neighbors, leaving 45 effective strata for raking.

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Following raking, weights were rescaled to a mean of one and trimmed at the 5th and 95th percentiles to limit the influence of extreme weights. The final scheme yields a Kish design effect of 1.34 (1.61 before trimming). Substantively, the weighted sample of 603 completes carries statistical power equivalent to a simple random sample of roughly 449 respondents, for an overall margin of error of approximately ± 4.6 percentage points at the 95 percent confidence level. Margins of error are correspondingly larger for subgroups. A small number of subgroups reported here are based on limited unweighted cases — respondents 18–29 ($n \approx 45$), Hispanic respondents ($n \approx 21$), the combined AAPI/Other group ($n \approx 58$), and respondents describing their gender in some other way ($n \approx 11$) — and should be read as directional; the latter group is excluded from the gender comparisons above.

A note on reported percentages: because each item offered a “Don’t know” option that we retain in the denominator, the net-agree and net-disagree shares for an item do not sum to 100 — the remainder is the “Don’t know” share. This choice matters most for the one item with elevated non-response, whether Delaware’s schools have enough funding, where 14 percent answered “Don’t know.”

Survey Instrument

Question wording as fielded. Instrument identifiers appear in bold. The agree/disagree battery used a common preamble and a common four-point scale with an explicit “Don’t know” option; scale order was rotated (1–4 / 4–1) across respondents, with “Don’t know” anchored last. Statements are listed in the order fielded.

Q1. Welcome! We would like to ask your opinion on issues facing Delaware. Your responses are completely confidential. First, to make sure our survey is representative of the whole state, in what county do you reside?

- 1) New Castle County
- 2) Kent County
- 3) Sussex County
- 4) I do not live in Delaware [Terminate]

Q2. “In this survey, we are going to [text: show / IVR: read] you a series of statements and ask if you agree or disagree with them. Do you agree or disagree with the following statement: ...”

- 1) Strongly agree
- 2) Somewhat agree
- 3) Somewhat disagree
- 4) Strongly disagree
- 5) Don’t know

Statements:

- **Q2a.** “People on probation should be sent back to prison only for committing a new crime. They should not be sent back for minor rule violations, like missing a meeting, not finishing a class, or failing a drug test.”
- **Q2b.** “Delaware legislators should change the law to prevent police from purchasing peoples’ private data (such as browsing history and location data) from data brokers without a warrant.”
- **Q2c.** “Delaware should pass a law that would make police body camera video open to the public.”

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- **Q2d.** “Homelessness is best handled through social programs, not through the courts and police.”
- **Q2e.** “Delaware police should not help federal Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) with civil immigration enforcement.”
- **Q2f.** “Delaware police should hold someone for ICE only if that person has a warrant for a crime. They should not hold someone just for being in the U.S. without legal papers.”
- **Q2g.** “Before helping ICE, state and local police should have to check that a judge has signed a warrant.”
- **Q2h.** “Delaware police should not be allowed to share information with ICE.”
- **Q2i.** “There should be stricter guidelines around how and when Delaware law enforcement can assist ICE.”
- **Q2j.** Embargoed
- **Q2k.** “People in Delaware who lose the right to vote after conviction for a crime should get that right back as soon as they leave prison.”
- **Q2l.** “Delaware residents should be able to register to vote and cast their ballot on the same day.”
- **Q2m.** “All voters should have the option to cast an absentee ballot.”
- **Q2n.** “Voting is a right only for people, and not corporations. This is true even if the corporation owns property and pays taxes in a community.”
- **Q2o.** “Delaware should change its constitution to protect the right to marry for all couples. This would cover couples of any gender and would treat all marriages the same under the law.”
- **Q2p. - Q2r.** Embargoed
- **Q2s.** “Delaware public schools have enough funding.”
- **Q2t.** Embargoed
