ACLU-DE CAMPAIGN FOR SMART JUSTICE

With 5% of the world's population and 25% of the world's prison population, it is easy to see that the U.S. has a mass incarceration problem. Delaware is part of that problem.


That's why reducing the prison population by 50% and challenging the racial bias in the system are the primary goals of our Campaign for Smart Justice.

We aim to educate the public about the staggering number of Delaware residents who are now or have been incarcerated, and how the system disproportionately targets people of color. We use public education, community organizing and grass roots advocacy to challenge the system and create change that has significant impact for individuals, families and communities.

It's time for Delaware to move away from its failed tough-on-crime approach. The violent crime in our communities is as much about our criminal justice policies circa 1980 or 1990, as it is about the lack of educational opportunities and jobs, and the proliferation of drugs in all corners of the state.

Smart justice here in Delaware means reducing the size of our prison population so that more resources can be devoted to high quality programs inside prison. When over 15,000 people churn into and out of our prison system every year, we can do no less if we want to keep our community safe.

HERE'S HOW

Sentencing Reform: We are working to reduce both the number of people entering prison and the laws and policies that drive extraordinarily long prison terms.

Bail Reform: We're overhauling the unjust and for-profit bail system that strips people of their rights, targets poor people and people of color, and hurts families and communities.

Prosecutorial Reform: Prosecutors in Delaware and across the country work towards convictions, not justice. We're challenging prosecutorial abuse and educating voters on how they can support reform.

Parole Reform: We are working to ensure systems are fair, respect people's rights, and promote safety and success for those returning to their communities.

Reentry: We are working to eliminate the barriers that hold back people living with a criminal record.
